#### Seniors-on-the-Move








The Boston Girl, by Anita Diamant

#### The Great American West

Our September speaker was Karin Breuer, Curator in Charge at Achenbach Foundation for the Graphic Arts. He compiled hundreds of paintings, prints, photographs and drawings into an amazing retrospective of his many road trips in the 50's and 60's. #### October Lunch & Learn

The speaker at our October Lunch and Learn was Catherine Miskow from the Foster City Historical Society. Catherine was born and raised in Foster City, and she specializes in making presentations on "Preserving the Past and Looking to the Future" of our wonderful 55 year old City.

She spoke to us about the very beginnings of Foster City in 1958 when T. Jack Foster, a local real estate developer and his sons, funded an energetic project through bonds to build a planned community on reclaimed land from the Bay. By 1961 the first lots were available and selling for \$21,000 per lot in 1971.

The Historical Society has meetings at the Rec Center the first Thursday of each month in order to preserve and transmit the unique history of one of the best planned communities in the United States. The public is always invited.





#### **COOL CATS**

I had the pleasure of attending a fundraiser this month for the "Cool Cats" of the Homeless Cat Network, a local non-profit rescue organization that Aldean Simi's daughter and son-in-law, Heidi and Tom Berens, work with and support. HCN feeds 900 colony cats each day; annually more than cats and 400 kittens spayed/neutered, and over 100 cats and kittens find forever homes. They are an all-volunteer organization that has humanely decreased the homeless cat population on the Peninsula through education, adoption and responsible colony management for over 20 years.

Tom Berens. our charming Master Ceremonies, gave us insight into the goals and successes of HCN and an overview of their new building in Belmont. He then masterfully managed the drawing of numerous raffle tickets. keeping it light and entertaining.
